Compatriot Michael Companion, others are not to historians who

I have rarely involved myself as a member of the Saratoga Battle Chapter.

Right now, I cannot keep quiet. I am and have always been a political Independent. I am a descendant of at least six American Patriots. All were farmers. None were slave owners.

I am also an amateur historian and have both studied and practiced genealogy for a number of years.

I am incensed at the current effort to attack memorials to Revolutionary War Patriots, recognized by lineage societies like ours or not, who may have owned slaves at a time when slavery was a socially acceptable practice.

These men and women had frailties like all of us. Some of those frailties are well known, others are not to historians who may have researched their lives.

Slave ownership, however, was not a frailty then.

Neither Christianity nor any other faith had an issue with slave ownership. Slavery was legal, just as ownership of livestock or real estate was legal.

We cannot apply the societal values of 2020 to 1780. Neither should we be denigrating the memory of the men and women who fought and provided leadership in our War for Independence.

Mayor Sheehan was wrong to order the removal of General Schuyler's memorial from the forecourt of the Albany, NY City Hall.

He is a part of the proud history of New York. Political correctness cannot and should not attempt to erase that.



I would encourage a public expression by the Saratoga Battle Chapter NSSAR of nonsupport of any effort to remove any memorial to a Revolutionary War Patriot in our region.

I would further support heavy prosecution of persons who damage or deface memorials to our history and our heroes in our region.

The Pomeroy Foundation's New York State Historic Marker Grant Program provides grant funding to pay for the marker for successful applications.



In his Invocation, Saratoga Battle Chapter Chaplain Charlie Wheeler called for all Americans to recognize the examples of the unknown soldiers who sacrificed their lives in Saratoga.

"Almighty God, in whose name the founders of our country won liberties and the torch of freedom. Let us recognize those who came together on this site in the fall of 1777 to stop the onslaught of Burgoyne's troops before they could reach Albany and the Hudson Valley. MONUMENT NEARLY 90 YEARS OLD

The Monument to the Unknown American Dead, also known as the "DAR Monument," is the largest in Saratoga National Historical Park.

The obelisk features a radiant sunrise representing the dawn of liberty. It displays 13 stars for the original 13 states; a sword to symbolize death and a laurel wreath for victory.

It was erected in 1931 after the DAR held a fundraiser and raised \$11,000 for its construction by asking for thirty cents from each of the organization's members nationwide, according to the National Park Service.

It is inscribed with the following words:

"To unknown American Soldiers who



perished in the Battles of Saratoga, Sept. 19 and Oct. 7, 1777, and were here buried in unmarked graves, helped to assure the triumph of the War of Independence, to create the Republic of the United States of America and to establish liberty throughout the world. In honor of these patriots, and in recognition of the bicentennial of the birth of George Washington, this memorial is erected by the Daughters of the American Revolution of New York State, 1931."
