was born in guest speaker.


Jost detailed his new book "Life and Death of a French

Saratoga Site Welcomes New Superintendent

An anthropologist with a background in planning and archaeology will lead Saratoga National Historical Park into the future.

The National Park Service announced Leslie Morlock will serve as Superintendent of the Stillwater site that preserves artifacts and hallowed ground where American and British soldiers sacrificed their lives during the Revolutionary War.

Morlock replaces former Superintendent Amy Bracewell, who transferred last year to the F.D.R. historic site at Hyde Park.

Morlock is the former Chief of Strategic Planning and Project Management at Delaware Water Gap National Recreation Area, a 70,000 acre site on the Delaware River bordering Pennsylvania and New Jersey.

In a press release, the National Park Service

said Morlock has overseen several programs related to environmental compliance, safety, leasing, lands and project management.

During the February meeting, the membership formalized the extension of terms in the event elections are cancelled.


In light of the retirement of longtime Chapter Genealogist Dennis Marr, former Chapter President Duane Booth agreed to fill the post.

Developed by Friends of Saratoga Battlefield with the help of other organizations and public officials, the 19-acre site off U.S. Route 4 near Schuylerville was dedicated in the fall of 2019, 242 years after the historic event.

The National Park Service announced that Saratoga National Historical Park has accepted the donation of the artwork, interpretive signage, memorials and other amenities from Friends of Saratoga Battlefield.

The Saratoga Surrender Site marks the location of the first instance in world history that the British Army capitulated. It is where British General John Burgoyne Surrendered his army to American

The March announcement said the land's owner, Open Space Institute Land Trust, Inc., provided an easement over the site.

In a news release issued by National Park Service, Saratoga National Historical Park acting Superintendent Chris Beagan said the Surrender Site is "a truly tremendous addition to the park."

"Fifteen years in the making, this acquisition demonstrates both extraordinary generosity and cooperation by many partners," Beagan said in the news release.

The National Park Service, in the announcement, outlined the global impact that October 17, 1777 surrender represented:

the location of the first instance in world history that the British Army capitulated. It is where British General John Burgoyne surrendered his army to American General Horatio Gates on October 17, 1777. This prompted French recognition of United States' independence, an alliance between the two nations, and an international war between Britain and France. Worldwide warfare expanded further still between Britain and Spain (1779), Britain and the Netherlands (1780), and Britain and Mysore (1780). Needing to extricate itself from

fighting five wars simultaneously,

Britain sued for peace and

recognized United States'

independence in 1783.

Several organizations helped make the site – and its preservation – possible. They include New York State, the Open Space Institute, the Town of Saratoga, The New York Natural Heritage Trust, the American Battlefield Protection Program, Friends of Saratoga Battlefield, the Historic Hudson Hoosic Rivers Partnership and individual and organizational donors.

French Military Life Revealed In New Book


We're extending congratulations to Saratoga France, Battle Chapter Member Bertrand Jost following the publishing of his new book, "Life and Death of a French Soldier in the American War of Independence 1778— 1781."

Here is the synopsis of the book:

"Through extensive research, the author reconstructed the story of a young French foot soldier from his enlistment in the King's army in 1778 to his death in November 1781, shortly after the battle of Yorktown. The story of Hans Stiegel serves as a thread to paint a broader picture of the American War of Independence through the eyes of the lower French ranks and helps answer some of the fundamental questions behind the reality of this war.

Why did these men enlist? How were they treated by their aristocratic officers? What was military life like in the barracks of

in the colonies and while on



expedition in America? What was it like to cross the Atlantic on an overcrowded transport? Upon arrival, what did these uneducated men think of the Americans they encountered: soldiers, civilians and slaves? What did they think of America itself and what was it like to fight in Yorktown when one had to spend the nights digging trenches

under constant enemy shelling and days fighting British sorties or storming enemy positions? To portray the war through the eyes of an enlisted soldier, the author focused on previously overlooked details in a large set of officers' accounts, incorporated new less known and unpublished sources and studied regiment rolls to gather details and statistics on the war casualties.

It took sixteen years to compile this extensive material, translate it and weave it into a chronological account."

Mr. Jost, discussed the revelations of his research during the February 2021 Annual Meeting.
