he small family cemetery
has been part of Mark
Young's home all his life.
He grew up on the
Porter Corners farm where his
ancestors were buried.

When he heard Saratoga County was seeking opportunities to honor Revolutionary War Patriots, Young said he decided to get involved.

Working with the Saratoga County Historian's Office and the Saratoga Battle Chapter, SAR, Young's home now features an Historic Marker honoring his ancestors' final resting place.

Saratoga Battle Chapter members joined the Chapter's Color Guard, members of the family and historians to unveil the new marker on December 8.

The new historic marker on
Ormsbee Road in the Saratoga
County Town of Greenfield was

A timeline of George Washington's military and political career during the American Revolution, 1774-1783.

The Library of Congress

July 6 – 18, 1774: Attends meetings in Alexandria, Virginia, which address the growing conflict between the Colonies and Parliament. Washington co-authors with George Mason the Fairfax County Resolves, which protest the British "Intolerable Acts"--punitive legislation passed by the British in the wake of the December 16th, 1773, Boston Tea Party. The Fairfax Resolves call for non-importation of British goods, support for Boston, and the meeting of a Continental Congress.

July 18, 1774: The Resolves are presented to the public at the Fairfax County Courthouse. Fairfax Resolves.

September 5 – October 26, 1774: The First Continental Congress meets in Philadelphia. Washington serves as a delegate from Virginia.

October 9, 1774: While attending the First Continental Congress, Washington responds to a letter from Captain Robert Mackenzie, then in Boston. Mackenzie, a fellow Virginia officer, criticizes the behavior of the city's rebellious inhabitants. Washington sharply disagrees and defends the actions of Boston's patriots. Yet, like many members of Congress who still hope for reconciliation, Washington writes that no "thinking man in all North

America," wishes "to set up for independency." George Washington to Robert Mackenzie, October 9, 1774

April 19, 1775: The battles of Lexington and Concord

1775: Ethan Allen and his Green Mountain Boys, and

Benedict Arnold and the Massachusetts and Connecticut militia, take Fort Ticonderoga on the western shore of Lake Champlain, capturing its garrison and munitions.

The Saratoga Battle Chapter, Sons of the American Revolution announces Saratoga

County Historian Lauren Roberts and assistant Historian Abby Burke were awarded the SAR's Bronze 250th Anniversary Medal and Certificate on December 8, 2023.

Saratoga Battle **Chapter President** Edward Munger Jr. presented the medals during a commemoration at the final resting site of Revolutionary War Patriots Ambrose Cole & Isaac Ormsbee, both of whom served as Privates of Rhode Island regiments in the American Revolution.

The 250th Anniversary of the American Revolution Program of the National Society, Sons of the American Revolution aims to encourage and recognize those who participate in events which educate and recognize, honor and celebrate the events and heroes of the period surrounding the

American Revolution.

Through their planning and participation in

The event took place at the home of Mark Young, a seventh-generation resident of the

Town of Greenfield farm called home by Patriot Isaac Ormsbee after the American Revolution. Clifford Young, a sixthgeneration resident, was also there.

There, a small cemetery sits in the yard with more than a dozen graves including those of Ormsbee and Cole and Mark Young's grandfather and father.

said Roberts and Burke do great work to help bring the honorable memories of our Patriot ancestors to the forefront.

"They put hard work, meticulous research and dedication into supporting and sharing the fascinating history of our region. Both Burke and Roberts deserve this recognition and more," Munger said.

purchased with grant funding from the William J. Pomeroy Foundation's Patriot Burials Marker Program.

The sign honors Ambrose Cole and Isaac Ormsbee, both buried in the family cemetery, who served the American cause after joining as Privates in Rhode Island.

Clifford Young, a fourth-generation descendant, said his Patriot ancestor left many pieces of memorabilia behind, there. including writing.

He said from what he learned, he believes Isaac Ormsbee selected the property to farm following his service in the American Revolution.

"He was looking for high ground," Clifford Young said, holding a spyglass his ancestor carried during the War.

Mark Young, who installed the sign and made a small driveway pull-off near the sign, said he plans to allow guests to visit and pay their respects, with permission.

Protected in the past by the hayfields that surrounded it, the small cemetery is more than part of Mark Young's home. Both his father and grandfather are also buried

The Saratoga County Historian's Office is planning to hold an unveiling of two other signs in the works at Patriot Burial sites.
