JONATHAN GOEBEL RECEIVES MINUTEMAN AWARD FROM NSSAR Past Pres, Col. Peter K. Goebel

Compatriot Jonathan E. Goebel was awarded the NSSAR Minuteman Medal at the 121st Annual Congress of the Sons of the American Revolution at Winston-Salem, North Carolina on Monday evening, 11 July 2011, for his extensive service to the Sons of the American Revolution.

The Minuteman Award is the most prestigious award of the National Society of the Sons of the American Revolution. The National Executive Committee established the award in 1951. Only those Compatriots who have made distinguished and exceptional contributions of service to the National Society may be recognized with the sixty year old medal. Each recipient may receive the award only once.

The beautiful medal is made of sterling silver. It depicts a Minuteman holding a musket, with a plow

and the Liberty Bell in the background. The medal is suspended from a neck ribbon of light blue silk.

The Minuteman Award was first presented at the 1952 National Congress. The first honoree was Former President General Benjamin H. Powell of Texas. The award has been presented annually since 1952. Since 1967, the year Jonathan was born, a maximum of six awards may be presented in each year. Through 2011, a total of three hundred and sixty-four Compatriots have been recognized with this highest award of the NSSAR, only for members.

Jonathan was inducted into the SAR on March 28, He served the National Society as Vice President General of the North Atlantic District for two terms, as a member of the NSSAR Nominating Committee, as National Trustee for four years, and as Alternate National Trustee for two years for the Empire State Society. Compatriot Goebel was the first-line signer for sixty-five new compatriots. He has served faithfully for many years on National Committees, most notably on the Young Members Committee for fifteen years; the Joseph S. Rumbaugh Orations and the **Membership** Committees thirteen for vears each; ROTC/JROTC Committee for twelve years; the Color Guard and the Historic Sites and Celebrations Committees for seven years each; the SAR-W3RLiaison Committee for five years: the Council of State Presidents (State President of the German Society) and the Youth Activities Committees for three years each; two years on the Council of Vice Presidents General; and the Strategic Planning He has attended twelve Annual Committee. Congresses and twenty-five National Leadership Meetings. He is a George Washington Fellow and a contributor to The Center for Advancing America's Heritage.

Jonathan was escorted by his brother, Colonel Peter K. Goebel, Minuteman Class of 2009. Their mother, Alice G. Goebel, was in attendance, as well as Jonathan's wife, Ruth, and their two daughters, Anna and Martha.

Peter and Jonathan are the third set of Brothers to receive the Minuteman Award and the first set to have their membership in the same State Society.

Registrar Dunne reported that as of September 18, 2011, our membership stood at 176, the largest in the Empire State Society. As a point of reference, your Editor can state that when he became a member in January of 1993, the chapter had about 37 members.

GENEALOGY NOTES

Any compatriots with French-Canadian ancestry who have not pursued it may be interested in the following. Dennis Marr recently completed an extensive research project into the French-Canadian ancestry of his sister-in-law, Sandra Benoit Marr. This consumed virtually all of his free time over a 6-month period and resulted in identifying over 1,800 ancestors.

A wonderful aspect of this research is that women are uniformly referred to by their maiden names. In addition, the church and vital records almost always include full names of the parents of the bride and groom, making it fairly easy (at least compared to American genealogy research) to extend a family back many generations.

This research was done using primarily 2 record collections. The first is the Drouin Collection of Quebec Church and Vital Records, 1621-1967. These are searchable at Ancestry.com and cover many religious denominations.

The second collection is the remarkable *Dictionnaire Généalogique des Familles Canadiennes*. This 7-volume set was compiled over a 19-year period by Fr. Cyprien Tanguay from the Catholic church records in Quebec. Vol. 1 covers the 1600's and Vols. 2-7 cover the 1700's.
