Registrar Duane Booth proudly announces that your chapter enrolled the most new members of any Empire State Society chapter for calendar year 2005. For this we have received a \$500 prize check from ESSSAR as well as possession of the coveted Addams Cup for one year.

Registrar Booth recognized compatriots Harry Taylor, Rick Saunders and Dennis Marr as having contributed to this achievement.

As of 15 May 2005, your chapter is now the largest in the Empire State Society, with 140 primary members, 7 dual state members and 3 dual chapter members, for a total of 150. 34 applications are pending approval (19 of these are included in the above count), which gives us a great head start towards possibly repeating as Addams Cup winners for 2006. CHAPTER MEMBERS ASSIST WALLOOMSAC BATTLE CHAPTER

Duane Booth and Dennis Marr participated in a genealogical program of the Walloomsac Battle Chapter. This event was held on June 3 at the Cambridge Historical Society and Museum in Washington County. Entitled "Connecting To Your Revolutionary Ancestors," the program attracted a number of strong candidates for SAR membership, including a possible "family application" group of 6-7 members. Also participating was the Ondawa Cambridge Chapter, NSDAR. As many of you know, the Walloomsac Battle Chapter was an offspring of our own Chapter a number of years ago.

OLDEST REV. WAR PATRIOT?

A startling item appeared on the SAR-TALK mail list recently. Citing an article in the October 1928 issue of the *Minute Man*, the official bulletin of the NSSAR, the oldest Revolutionary War patriot seems to be one Henry Francisco, born in France on 11 June 1686 and who died in Whitehall, Washington Co., NY on 24 Oct 1820 at the age of 134+years!

Your skeptical editor checked around, and found him a qualifying ancestor in DAR with those dates. I also located online an interview conducted with Henry in the fall of 1819 by Prof. Benjamin Silliman, Jr. of Yale College.

Henry stated that his father fled France to Amsterdam, after the revocation of the Edict of Nantes, which had granted religious tolerance to French Protestants (Huguenots). His father married a Dutch woman, returned to France and fled again when Henry was age 5, first to Holland and then to England. Henry said that he fought in all of Queen Anne's wars and was in many battles. He showed his numerous war wounds to the professor. After coming to America, he fought at Niagara, at Owsego and on the Ohio in the French and Indian War. During the Revolution, when he was around 90, he was taken prisoner and sent to Quebec.

Henry kept a tavern at Fort Edward during the Revolution, and Tories burned his house and barn. He had 2 wives and 21 children, his second wife being 60 years his junior. In 1819 he was living in the house of his youngest daughter, who was age 52 and born when Henry was 82. He avoided meat and ate mostly bread and butter and baked apples and drank 9 cups of tea per day. He still worked daily in 1819.
