R.O.T.C./J.R.O.T.C. AWARDS PRESENTED

The chapter continues its long support of the R.O.T.C. programs at both the secondary school and college levels.

Silver NSSAR R.O.T.C. awards were presented to the three combined service programs at Siena College/Rensselaer Polytechnic Institute.

<u>TIPS ON USING ANCESTRY.COM</u> Dennis F.M. Marr, Genealogist

Ancestry.com is the largest subscription genealogy site on the Internet. Many users fall into the habit of doing a more or less "generic" search for information, when it is possible to dig much deeper into their 28,000+ databases. You may not have known that when you enter names and locations under their "Search" tab that your results are not from a scan of all databases; these results are only from a search of the most common Ancestry databases: censuses, military, immigration, directories/member lists and birth, marriage and death records. To be sure, this is a tremendous amount of information.

However, if you fail to get what you are looking for with this initial search, you can go the equivalent of a library card catalog and hand-pick databases that look the most promising. To do this, click first on the "Search" tab from the home page. To the right will be a box entitled "Browse Records." The databases that you see listed here are among those scanned in the initial, general search. Go all the way to the bottom of this box and click on "list all databases." This brings you to the first page of the 28,481 databases (as of 17 May 2009). At the bottom of this first page is a search box where you can refine your search terms. You can then type in a database title. If you get no hits, it's probably because the actual database title is slightly different. In this case use the second box entitled "keyword(s);" I have personally have had tremendous luck using this feature, and you do not then have to know the exact title of a particular database.

Doing this keyword search should turn up one or more databases that are relevant to your search.

If you are looking for, say, records from Albany, NY, you could also go to the alphabetical database listing. This can

be a bit cumbersome, as you need to continuously "drill down" to get to where you want to go. In this example, you would click first on "A," then "Al" and finally "Alba." There will be databases, in alphabetical order, beginning with "Alba" and you can easily scroll down to the ones containing "Albany." To use this feature, go to:

Ancestry.com is not cheap, especially since they abandoned a-la-carte pricing in favor of two large "bundles," US records and World records.

You may find that using this search technique will help you to get more out of your Ancestry subscription. Remember, too, that data is continuously being added, so it can pay to repeat searches that in the past might not have paid off.

FamilySearch.org EXPANDING

The Latter Day Saints (LDS) website FamilySearch.org is in the process of adding tremendous amounts of new data to their site. Much material previously available only on microfilm is being digitized and put online. They have set up a pilot site where you can experiment with this new material and see what's being added periodically. Go to:

FamilySearch also has a detailed "card catalog." Using this feature, you can search on place, keyword, title, etc. to find record groups that may be of help to you. You can then have relevant microfilm sent to a local Family History Center for your use. Find the catalog at:

INTERNET ARCHIVE

Formerly known as the "Wayback Machine," this site can take you back to what a particular web page looked like at a specific date in the past. This is very helpful when you know where you once found information but it is no longer there. Start at:
