REGISTRAR DUNNE PARTICIPATES IN GRAVE MARKING

Registrar Tom Dunne sends along a nice writeup on the placement of a new grave marker on the grave of his Revolutionary War uncle, Jotham Bemus, Jr.

Jotham (1760-1813) enlisted in 1776 in Van Schaick's NY Regiment, and later served in the Rhode Island Regiment under Lt. Col. Jeremiah Olney and Col. Christopher Greene. It is likely that Jotham saw action at the Battles of Saratoga. Continuing his service with the Rhode Island units, Jotham was discharged on June 15, 1783 at Saratoga with the rank of Corporal. He later served in the War of 1812 from western New York. Jotham died on March 24, 1813 in the town of Hamburg, Erie Co., NY of a leg wound or disease incurred in the War of 1812.

Jotham was buried in the Deuels Corners Cemetery in present-day Orchard Park, NY. On May 24, 2012, Tom Dunne, along with Daryl Verstreate, ESSSAR Graves Chairman and Mr. Alfred F. Keeler, President of the Deuel Cemetery Association, placed a new marker on Jotham's grave.

1940 CENSUS FACTS

The long-awaited 1940 census was released by NARA on April 1. Several online genealogy sites have uploaded the images of the entire US census and are in the process of indexing it (the upload took Ancestry.com 4 days!). The country comprised over 132 million individuals, so the indexing project is massive.

This census asked extensive questions, including highest grade attended in school, residence on April 1, 1935, employment status for persons over age 14, earnings, birthplace and language of parents, Social Security participation, and number of weeks worked in 1939. For women, it also asked for age at first marriage, whether married more than once and total number of children.

Children born before April 1, 1940 are included in this census. An interesting question asks for the language spoken by each individual in earliest childhood.

Another series of questions pertains to veteran status. Specifically, it asks whether the individual is a veteran of the US military, or the wife, widow or under-18 child of a veteran.

I looked up my father, who was still single in 1940, and found him living with his father in the old Marr homestead in South Troy. I was interested to see that my grandfather's education ended at sixth grade.

Ancestry.com completed the indexing of the census for New York State on June 5. Other states completed as of June 28 include Vermont, Maine, Virginia, Ohio and Pennsylvania.

Your Editor will need to make it to age 80 to be able to find himself in the 1950 census, having been born in 1942.
