CONGRATULATIONS TO BILL GLIDDEN

Past President Bill Glidden, a noted military historian was recently awarded the title of Registered Historian at the state conference of the Association of Public Historians. Qualification for this award is on a point system in four areas related to historical activities.

Bill was instrumental in the establishment of the New York State Military Museum and Veterans Research Center in Saratoga Springs (our chapter is a charter member of the museum). He has served as the Town of Plattsburgh Deputy Historian and is on the War of 1812 Bicentennial Council. Other offices held include Town of Beekmantown Historian and Past President of the Battle of Plattsburgh Commemoration Committee. Bill has also done much to foster positive relationships with historical organizations in Canada.

Bill's knowledge of history, especially military history, is broad and deep and we congratulate him on this well-deserved recognition.

RONALD ERWIN NEWTON 29 April 1937 – 12 April 2013

Newton, Ronald Erwin KENNEBUNK, Maine Ronald Erwin Newton of Thompson Road in Kennebunk, died of pancreatic cancer on Friday, April 12, 2013 at Gosnell Memorial Hospice House in Scarborough, Maine. He was born April 29, 1937 in Brattleboro, Vt., to Robert Sheldon and Bertha Whitney Newton at his grandparents' home. He grew up in St. Albans, Vt., and attended Bellows Free Academy. The family moved to Odgensburg, where he graduated valedictorian of the class of 1955 at Odgensburg Free Academy. He graduated from Cornell University in 1960 where he played clarinet in the Big Red Marching Band. Ron became an Eagle Scout in Vermont in 1953 and during that summer was one of Vermont's representatives traveling by Boy Scout Troop Train to the National Boy Scout Jamboree in Newport Harbor, Calif. This trip was an important influence throughout his life. He married Helen Pratt of Greenwich on August 29, 1959. They eventually settled in New Baltimore. Ron was an utility rates analyst for the New York State Public Service Commission for 34 years. Ron was a volunteer fireman for 30 years in the Cornell Hook and Ladder Company and a fire commissioner for the fire district for 20 years. He was active in the churches he attended, a past master of the Social Friendship Lodge, and was a member of Bethlehem Lodge in Delmar, and York Lodge No. 22 in Kennebunk. Ron was active in Boy Scouts for 60 years, serving as cub master, scout master and district commissioner as his sons moved through the ranks, attaining their Eagles. He was honored with the Silver Beaver Award in 1983 and worked at three National Jamborees. Ron became interested in genealogy, following in his parents' footsteps. He joined the National Society of Sons of the American Revolution in 1980. In New York State, he was president of the Saratoga Battle Chapter and the Empire State Society, as well as a past national trustee for both New York and Maine and vice president general for the Maine State SAR. He also was a past governor of the Vermont Mayflower Society and past senior state president of the Maine Children of the American Revolution. In 1995, Ron and Helen retired and moved to Kennebunk. For several years he volunteered at the Seashore Trolley Museum. He was treasurer of Haskell-Marston Camp of Sons of Union Veterans and Church Community Outreach Services, Inc. of Kennebunk, Kennebunkport and Arundel. Ron was predeceased by his parents and a son, Robert Forrest. He is survived by his wife of 53 years; a son, David O. Newton, and his wife, Suzanne, of Old Orchard Beach; and daughter, Ronda R. Newton, and her husband, Steven Anderson, of Lemoyne, Pa.; as well as several step-grandchildren and great-grandchildren. He is also survived by two sisters, Sylvia Curley of Duanesburg, and Barbara Newton of Albuquerque, N.M. Memorial visiting hours will be Friday, April 19, 2013 from 6 to 8 p.m. at Bibber Memorial Chapel, 67 Summer St., Kennebunk with Masonic and Eastern Star services. A memorial service will be held on Saturday, April 20 at 11 a.m. also at Bibber Memorial Chapel. Interment will be on Saturday, June 22 at 2 p.m., at Easton Rural Cemetery on Meeting House Road off Route 40 in Easton. The family wishes to thank everyone, especially Christ Church which has supported us with prayers and care throughout Ron's illness.
