**ONLINE SURNAME QUERIES?**  
**TWO YEARS IS A CHARM!**

Recently, I have had several experiences that I think demonstrate the value of long-term trolling, via Internet postings.

The first concerns a query about a marriage, as the original town record book my great uncle mentioned in his notes, was lost in a flood in 1972. After two years, I received a reply from a cousin who lives in South America, about a resource on the Web that had a newspaper listing of a marriage I needed. In corresponding with this newfound cousin, he mentioned that he thought one person in this marriage was the sister of an ancestor he had been searching for 15 years, to no avail. I was able to present him with the names and dates, as well as documentation, for 250 years of ancestors with several SAR and Mayflower notables.

The second is more significant from my personal standpoint. While searching for my wife's ancestors, I had placed several Surname queries on Rootsweb.com, seeking information on family members in several lines; I was hoping to share information with others that would be mutually beneficial.

I recently received a reply to a two-year old posting that gave me the parents, as well as grandparents, I sought. This led to a most interesting Revolutionary War ancestor for my wife. We have completed a DAR application which I think warrants sharing, simply for its being interesting.

We were searching for the parents of Angelina Whitehead, in Oswego County NY. It turned out that her grandfather, Ezra Trim, was a Revolutionary War veteran via Connecticut and New York. Briefly, his family moved from CT to Dutchess Co, NY and then to PA on the frontier at Lackawaxen in 1762/63. Unfortunately, the Moses' family was attacked in October 1763 by the Delaware Indians, allies of the French (enemies of the Iroquois). The mother Rebecca was killed, as were several of their children. Ezra, at the age of 13, along with a brother, was captured by the Indians and taken to Canada. Along the way, apparently, the older brother could not keep up and was killed.

September 1764 newspaper accounts relate the release of several captives, including young Ezra Trim, through the efforts of Sir William Johnson, who had just returned from Fort Niagara. Ezra was returned to Connecticut, and it appears he lived with a cousin prior to moving to Dutchess County, New York. In the Revolutionary War he served in the Continental Line from CT, and then in several units from NY. He received a pension and is mentioned on a DAR Monument in Palmyra, NY.

So, trolling for ancestors requires little bait, but can bring in big fish!
