Our speaker for the dinner was local author and historian James Richmond. Mr. Richmond provided highlights from his book *War On the Middleline* (available at Amazon.com). The topic begins with the initial settlement of the Kayaderosseras Patent and into the Revolutionary War period where individual characters and stories intertwine and ultimately come together with the British Raid on Ballston in 1780. Several individuals were taken prisoner into Canada as part of the raid. The book and presentation concludes with the return of those individuals in late 1782 - some escaped while others were released by treaty.
